
Read the directions and look at the table and map below. Then answer the questions. Write your answers on the lines and then print this page.

#### How to Make a Garden Plan

- First, check a seed catalog or a gardening guide to learn what grows well in your area. List the plants you will grow.
- Second, check the catalog or guide to learn how much space each plant needs. Make a table to show each plant and how far apart it should be planted. See the example.

Plant	Symbol on Map	Space
Tomato	Т	3 feet apart
Carrot	С	3 feet apart
Rose	R	2 feet apart

- Third, measure the length and width of the garden.
- Fourth, make a map of your garden.
- Fifth, decide which plant you want to grow the most of. Mark out the space on your map for that plant. Add the other plants as space allows.
